NEW ALTAR GUILD CHANGES



A call to care!

As we begin the month of July, I'd like us to reflect a bit on the gospel reading for the 5th Sunday after Pentecost, which is the first Sunday in July. Jesus addressing his disciples in chapter 10 of Mathew, says to them, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward, and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous; and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple — truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward." (Matthew 10:40-42)

Over the last week, the supreme court has made three significant rulings on affirmative action, issues affecting same-sex marriages, and student loan forgiveness that have been received with variant emotions across the country. Regardless of the emotions expressed, one thing stands out; we are more disintegrated and broken as a nation than ever before. It is sad to imagine that while some people celebrate the SCOTUS ruling on these issues, others are deeply concerned about their lives, freedoms, and future based on the same ruling. I'm sure the authors of our Pledge of Allegiance did not have this state of the nation in mind when they wrote, "... one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all".

In the Gospel passage above, Jesus tells his disciples that whoever welcomes them will, in turn, be welcoming Jesus and, by extension, God. We all would like to imagine that if Jesus showed up at our doorstep, we would welcome him. We think we would recognize him immediately, and we would ask him to come in with joy. We would go out of our way to find and fix a meal for him and ensure he is as comfortable as possible. We would then sit at his feet in silence to learn from him and open our hands for a blessing when he rises to leave.

Well, what if Jesus has been coming to our doorsteps all along, and because of our divisive politics, we have failed to recognize him? What if Jesus came to our doorstep disguised as one from a different racial, sexual, social, or religious background than we are accustomed to? What if we have been shutting Jesus off by the way we have been so selfish to notice the pains of other people?

If there's anything we can learn as people of God, it is for everybody to love everybody. We know from scripture that when we love, care, and invite others, we also invite Jesus. Jesus becomes the host and not a guest anymore. When we empathize with others and refuse to celebrate their downfall, we are guaranteed a reward by Jesus. The reward doesn't need to be a material possession; it can take any form; one thing we know about God is that he keeps his word.

Blessed month, people of God.
